# Adamstown topples gritty Belswans 1982

GOALS in each half gave Adamstown Rosebuds a 2-0 victory over Belmont-Swansea in the Northern Soccer Federation State first division match at Blacksmiths Oval yesterday.

Adamstown battled against a traditionally competitive rival before a 39th-minute penalty allowed the visitors to take a 1-0 lead.

Until striker Carl Lochrin converted from the penalty spot Adamstown did not look comfortable against the strong-tackling Belswans.

Adamstown could have been staring at a halftime deficit after half chances to striker Paul Queenan in the first, 17th and 25th minutes were all smothered by the Adamstown defence.

Adamstown's only attack before referee Robbie Davies awarded the penalty came in the 19th minute when Lochrin preyed on a backheader by a Belswans stopper to scoop a volley just over the cross-

Rosebuds were much more positive in attack after the break and were rewarded with a second goal in the 65th minute.
