To the players - do not be taken in by glossy verbal promises. It is your ability the clubs are after, so get what you want in black and white, on paper, from the top officials of the club.

• To the officials — it is high time soccer in Australia had a set of rules that gave a fair deal to all associations throughout the land.

Why not a body of men paid full time to look into and study every aspect of the game from junior to senior levels?

In particular, a transfer and retention system binding on all associations in Australia.

As a result of having played at both junior and senior level, I fail to see why both levels cannot be united to form a club in the true sense of the word.

I have heard it said that many junior clubs have more money than the senior clubs. A rather embarrassing situation indeed.

And where do the senior clubs get

their junior players? Instead of being "expected" to join the senior level of your club after finishing your junior level, it seems only commonsense that the two unite
